LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

In April 2019, Table to Table (T2T) rescued its 20 millionth pound of food. T2T now rescues twice as much food every year than we did in 2014, which is a feat we could only achieve with the very hard work of volunteers and staff. I joined the team in 2017, and it's been exhilarating to be even a small part of this journey. I'm thrilled to tell you how we've gotten here.

Five years ago, our waitlist for food donors and food recipients was growing. We had a clear opportunity to do more. Yet, the equivalent of three full-time staff were operating in 700 squarefeet of space with limited parking for vans. Staff, volunteers, and vehicles were all maxed out. Despite these limitations, we continued to increase our food collection from current partners. But our answer to all remaining uncollected food had to be, "We just can't."

In 2016, realizing the only way forward is through and bolstered by the incredible community support built over 20 years, T2T leaders instead asked: "How can we?"

Getting through these many barriers to growth began with a move from our longtime home in Old Brick. Relocation catalyzed opportunities in ways we never could have imagined. More space and more parking led to new volunteer roles and an 80% increase in the number of volunteers. Volunteers freed up staff time to focus on operational efficiency, which resulted in a 40% increase in food donor and recipient partnerships.

At the same time, T2T refocused efforts to meet nutritional needs. Those who don't have adequate access to food have even

less access to nutritious fresh foods. So in 2017, we prioritized the collection of foods with higher nutritional value. The result has been a 27% increase in produce, protein, and dairy.

And that is the "how," but it is not the why. We all want to nourish ourselves and our families. Some of us face unequal burdens due to life circumstances that have nothing to do with whether or not someone deserves to eat, and thus, deserves to live. All of us imagine a community in which no edible food is wasted and where our food and our peop


We put 10 percent of our national energy budget, 50 percent of our land use, and 80 percent of our freshwater resources into food production. Then we truck this food around the country. Only to end up throwing away nearly 40 percent of everything we produce, much of which is still edible and healthy.

Once this food has reached Johnson County, it's so close to realizing its potential. Without Table to Table, 2.4 million pounds of food each year would be lost, and with it the opportunity to feed people, fight climate change, and retain economic value.



In capturing this valuable resource, Table to Table:

- Provides costly FRESH AND PERISHABLE FOODS to our partners for free.
- Saves greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to 17,400 POUNDS OF COAL BURNED.

ONE IN FIVE CHILDREN* don't have access to healthy meals. An average of 61% of the food we deliver to vouth serving agencies was FRESH PRODUCE, DAIRY OR PROTEIN.

19,310 people* in Johnson County do not know how they will put food on the table. They do not know how they will both feed themselves and pay rent, put gas in the car to get to work, pay their medical bills, or clothe their family.

Through our partners, T2T food reaches 1 in 7 residents in Johnson County, serving people in Solon, Hills, Tiffin, North Liberty, Coralville, and Iowa City. Table to Table extends the ability of hunger relief agencies to fill unmet food needs.

Volunteers

What do volunteers do at Table to Table? The better question is what PON'T they do? We simply could not function without them.

This year, <u>460</u> volunteers gave more than 18,000 hours of their

time — equivalent to the work of nearly 9 FULL-TIME positions.
